USMLE EXAM Gerry Sheridan

Decide Early in your training if you want to pursue a fellowship in the U.S.

If you do decide to go to the U.S., **target your institution of interest early** on (fellowship application deadlines are often 18 months to 2 years in advance of the start date. You also need to allow time to build a rapport with the department before you apply – Another reason to start early!).

Enquire as to whether the fellowship programme of your choice requires you to have Step 3 completed or if they accept ECFMG certification (Step 2 CS completed but not step 3) – This often varies depending on the state to which you are applying. You should also enquire as to whether the fellowship is accredited or not as you will need to go through the 'SF Match' if it is accredited.

Ideally aim to sit all exams as close to final Med as possible (ST 5, 6 and 7 of your training should be reserved to prioritise study for the FRCS – Although it is possible to sit them all closer to the FRCS as I did. I would recommend ideally finishing them earlier however).

The 'First Aid' books (Step 1, Step 2 CK and Step 2 CS) were all that I used to prepare. They are big books, but simple to read and seemed to cover the syllabus adequately enough to allow you to pass without too much difficulty.

I paid for the **Step 1 MCQ bank 'UWorld USMLE'**. This was a useful tool. Word of warning – do not be disheartened if your practice scores using this bank are below the pass mark, you will score higher in the real exam. For the Step 2 MCQ bank I used 'Pastest USMLE'. This a bit cheaper than the 'UWorld USMLE' bank and perhaps not just as comprehensive. I found it to be enough to pass first time however. These are physically challenging exams (7 hours and 8 hours with only 40 mins break!) so be prepared.

Step 2 CS is back to basic clinical examinations (wash your hands, ask for consent, make eye contact etc). I found that this was well covered in the First Aid book. You really should utilise the online resource on the 'USMLE' website where you can find sample video recordings of how ideal candidates would interact with the patient actors. Find a friend or partner who is willing to let you practice history taking and physical examinations. This is my most useful piece of advice for step 2 CS. The thing that will likely catch you out the most is your timing, it goes by very fast and you have a lot of bases to cover. I found the FRCS to be very useful for training me to keep to time for this aspect of the exam.

Practically, **Philadelphia is the closest test centre to Europe.** The flight over is quite short and the city itself is a great place to visit!

Best of luck if you decide to sit them!

Arthroplasty Fellowship, Musgrave Park Hospital Belfast

I am currently doing a 12 month Arthroplasty Fellowship in Musgrave Park Hospital Belfast. Supervising Consultants are Prof Beverland, Mr. D.Molloy, Mr. L. Cusick, Mr Mockford and Mr S. O'Hagan. They all work together within the Arthroplasty unit at Musgrave Park Hospital. There are two fellows, one local and one from outside Northern Ireland. The fellows are staggered, starting 6 months apart.

The Consultants were all taught by Prof Beverland so they teach his surgical technique with their own minor modifications. This surgical technique is refined such that, they have removed what they have deemed to be unnecessary steps. The result of this streamlined surgical technique means that total hip replacements can performed in 30 minutes and tourniquet times in total knee replacements can regularly be as low as 25 minutes. Incisions are kept small with minimal disruption to the soft tissue. Being able to perform surgery quickly with minimal tissue disruption has benefits that they are able to exploit. Two of the consultants run lists where they perform 6 to 7 joints on a list and are still finished by 4.30. They also routinely perform bilateral total hip replacements and bilateral total knee replacements and because of the short operating time for each side, the bilateral procedure is able to be performed under the one spinal without any issues. In my time there so far, I have seen a man come in for bilateral total hips on the morning of surgery and be discharged home that evening.

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That is the other thing that they have perfected, same day surgery or significantly reduced inpatient stay. Patients done early on a list, that are up to it, go home the same day. Otherwise, the vast majority of patients go home on day one post op with only a few remaining to day 3. The surgical technique, preoperative and postoperative care are all structured to facilitate early discharge and I would hope to be able to bring some of these methods back with me. It is all the small things that they do that make the difference. There is also access to revision surgery with revision THRs and revision TKRs regularly being performed within the unit. Unicompartmental Knee replacements are also performed within the unit and it is possible to learn to do these. These are done as another 20 minute operation. Mr Molloy does Hip Arthroscopy and Mr Cusick does some of his tumour work in Musgrave park and I've had the chance to scrub in for a few total femoral replacements.

Musgrave Park hospital is an elective hospital so there are no on call commitments but roughly once a month, you need to spend a weekend in Belfast to cover the wards and the outcomes unit in case there are any surgical issues with post operative patients. It is a nice place to work, everyone is very nice and helpful and once they have indoctrinated you in their techniques, you get to operate.

In summary, if you are interested in learning surgical techniques for THR and TKR to help minimise operating times and length of stay, be involved in complex primaries, revision surgery, unicompartmental Knee replacements and Hip Arthroscopy, this fellowship is worth a look. I would hope to take a lot from what I learnt in this fellowship with me going forward.

Hobby: Whitewater Kayaking Nuala McAuley

Whitewater kayaking is my preferred hobby. It always seems like a great sport for Ireland as it's one of the few where it is better when it's raining heavily as there's water in the rivers. We have a great variety of rivers in Ireland with excellent runs – from easy flat water with a few more enjoyable weirs on the lower Liffey to the steeper exciting rivers in the Wicklow mountains which become fast moving, technical whitewater with plenty of boulders, waves, and rocks to make things interesting when there's been rain. The number of weekends where there is water to run the best stretches (and I'm not working) is less than you might think for a country famous for its rain, but when it works it's perfect.

There is no one key reason I like this above all other sports, but a lot of little ones. Some element of it is the challenge – taking a difficult, potentially dangerous piece of fast moving water, reading how the water behaves, planning how you would navigate it and then executing that plan is satisfying; and when it goes well the sense of speed and power you get is truly exhilarating. That is only small part though – kayaking gives you stunning views of Ireland and the world, both the nature and the cities. I have had kingfishers and other hard to spot birds close enough I could have touched them, and been on rivers where there is not a man made structure in view. Probably the most remote I have got to was in the US when I went with a group of

friends on a trip down the Grand Canyon. It was an amazing experience. The canyon is impressive enough to look down into but to be on the river at the floor, looking up at the rock colours, and carvings and pre-historic paintings (while also having to navigate powerful rapids) was truly special. We were thirteen days on the water, camping at night, with no road access or phone signal, covering two hundred and eighty miles in total.



No sport is for everyone and many people may never even try kayaking. It's gear heavy, weather dependant, and has the potential to go seriously wrong if you overestimate your abilities and take on something you shouldn't. But for me it's definitely my favourite way to spend my weekends or holidays.
