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NEW PRESIDENT OF THE IITOS PROFESSOR JOHN O'BYRNE

Professor O'Byrne was elected as



President of the IITOS at the AGM on Friday, 25th of November. He has taken over from Mr Paddy Kenny, who completed his very busy three year term of office.

Professor O'Byrne has a large clinical practice, specialising in hip and knee surgery. His main practice interests are predominantly hip and knee arthroplasty, but also arthroscopy and sports injuries. His practice is based at Cappagh National Orthopaedic Hospital, Mater Private Hospital and Sports Surgery Clinic, Santry.

Professor O'Byrne is the founder and director of Taught MCh Programme, RCSI, which was established in 2009. It was an innovative programme with taught modules and an original research component. There were 55 students enrolled in the MCh programme for 2014-15. To date, 137 students have graduated. Professor O'Byrne is also Orthopaedic Surgeon to the Irish national soccer team and deals with extensive referral for sports injuries.

PROFESSOR TIM O'BRIEN

A Retirement Evening for Professor Tim O'Brien, founder of the Gait Laboratory at the Central Remedial Clinic (CRC) in Dublin was held on Thursday, 24th of November. The Gait lab is one of the specialist medical services provided at the CRC and was established in 1989. The CRC has been providing medical, therapeutic, technical and educational services for children and adults with disabilities since April 1951, when Lady Valerie Goulding and Kathleen O'Rourke set up the clinic. They were responding to the needs of children and adults who were left with disabilities after an outbreak of poliomyelitis in Ireland in the 1940s and 1950s.

Mr. Michael Walsh, manager of the gait lab, chaired the evening. His welcome address was followed by the CEO's message delivered by Ms Stephanie Manahan. Also speaking at the event were Dr Owen Hensey, Medical Director of the CRC and Mr Martin Gough, orthopaedic surgeon from Guy's and St. Thomas's hospital in London as well as Prof Tim O'Brien himself. Messages were broadcast from orthopaedic and medical colleagues around the world as well as a former service user of the CRC Gait lab.

CRC staff and colleagues at home and abroad will miss Professor O'Brien and wish him well in his retirement.



CANDIDATE ADVANCED NURSE PRACTITIONER ORTHOPAEDICS



My Nursing career began in 1998. I had a fantastic three years

training in Wexham Park Hospital Trust with Thames Valley University along with many other Irish nurses at that time. It was in my final year that I found my passion for Trauma Orthopaedic Nursing. I remained in the UK for a further year after qualifying and in 2002 I returned to Limerick Regional Hospital, now known as University Hospital Limerick (UHL) a model four hospital within University Hospital Group. The Trauma Ward was opened late in 2002. This new initiative enhanced services for trauma orthopaedic patients who were previously nursed on general surgical wards or transferred to Croom Orthopaedic Hospital for management. All staff were engaged, on the setting up of the new trauma ward, which enabled patients with orthopaedic trauma injuries be cared for in a specialist setting, by a nursing team with specific orthopaedic knowledge and skills.

I enhanced my academic and professional development through further education over the following five years. I attained a Bachelor of Science, Nursing Degree, with The University of Limerick, a Higher Diploma in Orthopaedic Nursing with the National University of Ireland Galway (NUIG) and a Certificate in Health Service Management for Staff Nurses in Dublin Institute of Technology (DIT). My continued professional development was also enhanced through attendance at many orthopaedic nursing courses and conferences. In 2007, when a Clinical Nurse Specialist (CNSp.) was advertised in Orthopaedic Nursing I was in an ideal position to apply and was overwhelmed when I was informed that I had been successful. I held the position of Orthopaedic CNSp. for nine years, where I gained a wealth of knowledge and experience in many different aspects of orthopaedics, including advanced clinical skills, undertaking clinical audit and research and led on many service improvement projects. I was afforded the opportunity to present at many orthopaedic nursing and medical

conferences nationally during this time I successfully completed the Certificate in Nurse Prescribing of Medical Ionising Radiation (X-Ray) course in 2010 followed by a Masters of Health Sciences (Advanced Practice) and a Certificate in Nurse/Midwife Medication Prescribing in NUIG which I concluded in 2014. I believe my time within my CNSp. role gave me the foundation that I need to prepare for my future role as an Orthopaedic Registered Advanced Nurse Practitioner (RANP). RANP's / RAMP's (Registered Advanced Midwife Practitioners) are not a new phenomenon. Currently in Ireland there are over two hundred RANP's/ RAMP's, although none are in the area of orthopaedic nursing. The Report on the Commission on nursing (Government of Ireland, 1998) was the catalyst for the introduction of this a new clinical career pathway for nurses. This took place during a time of unprecedented health service reform in nursing which included major changes in nurse education and training and the development of the undergraduate nursing degree programme. Post graduate nurse educational programmes were developed and enhanced across many areas of specialist practice, including orthopaedic nursing. A Registered Advanced Nurse Practitioner must be educated to master's degree level or higher, this master's programme must be in the area which reflects the specialist field of practice (orthopaedics) and must have a substantial clinical modular component.

Currently you need to have seven years' post registration experience five of which must be in the area of specialist practice. I was appointed "Candidate Advanced Nurse Practitioner Orthopaedics (cANP)" in March of 2016. The role of the cANP in collaboration with the local RANP Orthopaedic Steering Group is to undertake the site preparation and job description development in line with post accreditation requirements set out by the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Ireland (NMBI). The cANP is responsible for the development of his/ her professional portfolio for submission to NMBI for registration as a Registered Advanced Nurse Practitioner. The overall purpose of the RANP Orthopaedic role is to provide safe, timely, evidenced based care to orthopaedic out-patients with musculoskeletal injuries at an advanced nursing level.

RCSI VIRTUAL REALITY MEDICAL SIMULATOR

VR has been around for around 20 years but it is only this year that commercially available head sets have been made available that deliver on the original idea, 2016 sees the release of all the major VR platforms including the official Oculus Rift, the HTC Vive, Playstation VR and the first to market: Gear VR. The Gear VR is unique in that it is the only fully portable version that can work on any of the newer Samsung phones. This is a major advantage in terms of access and distribution. RCSI (Donncha Ryan, Learning Technology Manager, Sean Tierney, Professor of Surgical Informatics, and Cuan Harrington, Surgical Research Fellow) with help from some external developers have developed and released the first truly interactive medical app for VR. Standing in the shoes of the Emergency Department trauma team leader, they must assess their patient, make critical decisions in real time and perform life-saving operative procedures step-by-step just like real surgeons do in emergency departments all over the world every day. This app includes an alternative, fully educational and didactic mode allowing those without medical training to practice their skills safely in this immersive virtual environment before they have to perform these procedures in real injured patients in the Emergency department. In the past RCSI has invested in high end surgical simulators, but recently has been focusing on making training available in a more mobile form. You can download this application for free on the Samsung Gear VR. To date it has had 75,000 downloads.

What is the goal of the app?

This app provides a realistic accessible and safe environment for trainee surgeons to experience highly realistic clinical scenarios, make critical decisions and act on those decisions. This allows trainees to learn through experience in the simulator and better prepares them for real world experience where errors may be the difference between life and death.

Who it is for?

This application is focused on providing both undergraduate medical students and post-graduate medical and surgical trainees with new learning opportunities. We have made it freely available so that those with an interest in the area can have some experience of what it is like to work in this pressured environment.

Key features of the app?

The application features an interactive encounter with a patient after a high-energy road traffic accident. Make life or death decisions in managing this patient in the Emergency Room while the clock is ticking. The application features an alternative educational mode for the general public, providing those without medical training an immersive, didactic earning environment.

Benefits it provides?

This application provides a safe and realistic training platform to rehearse and simulate commonly encountered, intense life or death scenarios without consequences.

This involves undertaking a complete episode of care which incudes, assessment, diagnoses, development of a treatment plan, evaluation, discharge and follow up autonomously, according to collaboratively agreed protocols and scope of practice in the clinical setting. Within the Department of Trauma Orthopaedics at UHL the role is being developed around out-patient fracture services. It will involve some service developments over-time such as Trauma Assessment Clinics. The current agreed caseload includes new. review and post-op patients that can be manage in the fracture clinic setting autonomously by the RANP. I am orthopaedic nurse with extensive clinical experience who has been fortunate enough to work in an environment where I was encouraged and supported to learn and develop in the progression of my clinical career to an advanced level. It is envisaged that the RANP Orthopaedic role, in collaboration with Orthopaedic Consultants and the multidisciplinary team will enhance services for out-patients with musculoskeletal injuries across the UL Hospital Group. The process for the development of the RANP post is robust and ensures clear clinical and professional accountability for the RANP as a practitioner. It provides assurances for the safety and quality of the service provided to the patient attending the service.

I would like to acknowledge the support of all members of the RANP Orthopaedic Steering Group at UHL especially the expertise and advice from all Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeons, Senior Nursing Management Team, Perioperative Directorate Nursing Management Team, Ms. Carmel Hoey, Nursing Midwifery Development Officer, HSE-West Mid-West, Ms. Catherine Farrell Programme Manager, National Trauma and Orthopaedic Clinical Programme and Ms. Niamh Keane Project Manager from the National Trauma and Orthopaedic Clinical Programme. I am delighted to be appointed the first cANP in Orthopaedics nationally and look forward to evaluating the effectiveness of the role in the future.
